

DO YOU LOVE YOUR NEIGHBOR?

Items needed: Chairs or definite sitting spots.

1. Have the group members sit in chairs in a circle. Ask for a volunteer to act as the leader. The leader stands in the center of the circle, with their chair taken away.
2. The leader then walks around the circle, stops, and asks a member the question, "Do you love your neighbor?"
3. There are two possible responses. If the response is "NO," the two people on either side try to switch chairs before the leader sits down in one of them. If the answer is "Yes," the person must name his two neighbors sitting on the side of him. And the leader moves on.

Variation: Give everyone a number including the leader. If the answer is "yes," everyone in the group, including the leader, must run for another chair. The person left without a chair becomes the leader for the next round. The person may also say "No, I would rather have numbers ___ and ___ for my neighbors and call what numbers the person wants. The two people whose numbers have been called get up and move to take the seats on either side of the caller. The two people who have been sitting next to the caller, as well as the leader, must scramble for the two seats vacated by those whose numbers were called.
